c) When the strange man appeared out of thin air.
5) How does the word squealed suggest about how Jimmy was feeling? [2a]
6) What do you think will happen next? Use evidence from the text in your answer. [2e]
7) What is the main idea of the first paragraph? [2c]
8) Why do you think a man appeared in Jimmy's bedroom? Use evidence from the text in your answer. [2d]
