COVID-19 Definitions

virus – Very tiny germs that can make you ill.

coronavirus – A group of viruses that has been around for a long time.

COVID-19 – A new type of coronavirus. It can make people feel very ill.

symptoms – A sign that you have an illness. Some symptoms of COVID-19 include a high temperature or coughing a lot.

lockdown – Where people stay at home most of the time to stop the spread of an illness.

pandemic – The spread of an illness across many places in the world.

PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) – Clothing, masks and gloves that people can wear to try to stop them catching an illness.

shielding – Staying indoors and away from other people to stop a person from catching an illness.

vulnerable – A person who is more at risk of catching an illness or getting very poorly if they get it.

flattening the curve – Slowing down the number of people who get ill all at once.

quarantine – Staying indoors and away from other people.

self-isolation – Staying indoors and away from other people.

social distancing – Staying away from people who aren't in your family.

key workers – People who need to carry on going to work to help other people. These include doctors, nurses and police officers.

ventilator – A machine that helps a person breathe.
